

For many in our country, 2021 will be remembered as the year of continued COVID lockdowns and mandates. For those of us associated with The WellHouse, it will be remembered as the year that God allowed us to see the new WellHouse Child program launched and receive our first children into the program. What a milestone!

Children are the most vulnerable and exploited group when it comes to sex trafficking. The average age for being lured into this dark world is somewhere between 12 and 17 years old. Jesus had some pretty harsh words for anyone that would harm a child, and as a society we should do everything within our ability to stop this crime from ever happening.

Some of the contributing factors that make a child vulnerable to sex trafficking include early childhood sexual abuse, the breakdown of the family, generational poverty, desensitization, and any other form of neglect and abuse. Some of the children targeted by predators are runaways, children with disabilities, children with low self-esteem, and foster care children.

Child predators now weaponize apps and social media against vulnerable children. They target then recruit these children mainly through deception, most frequently posing as a peer. Sexting and coercing children to send nudes fuels the porn industry. We know that one of the root causes of sex trafficking is pornography. Pornography fuels demand, and images of children are used by pimps for training and grooming of these innocent victims.

Let us as a society do all we can to protect the most vulnerable among us, and in the meantime, Wellhouse Child will be there rescuing those who need us the most! Thank you always for partnering with The WellHouse; we could not do this without you!

LEANN'S SURVIVOR STORY

This is the story of a WellHouse Graduate who is now employed on our staff. These are her actual words.

My mom had me at 15 years old. I first remember her passed out on drugs at our home in Louisiana. When I was 12, my grandfather was diagnosed with kidney disease. My grandmother worked in a factory and needed help. I didn't think twice about caring for my grandfather because I loved him so much. When I was 14, my aunt fell down seven flights of stairs. The fall left her paralyzed. She needed intense care. So, I quit school and began caring for her as well. At 15, I met Robby. We started dating and moved in together. He smoked crack cocaine and got me hooked too. It was my first experience with drugs. Although he was abusive, I stayed with him for years. After my grandparents died, my life changed forever. It ripped a hole in my heart, and I didn't care much anymore. Robby and I split up, and I quit drugs. But at 21, I was pregnant with my first child.

A year later, I met a man named Chris and we got married and had two children together. Things started to look better, but not for long. Eventually, we started doing cocaine together. One night, I went to a bad area of town to get drugs. There, two Crips held me at gunpoint and made me drive to an abandoned house where they raped me. I heard them say they were going to finish me off. Instead, they backed my car into a ditch and ran. A couple found me and called 911. When I left the hospital, I told Chris what happened. He said he wouldn't touch me again. He took custody of my kids and left.

Alone, I made my way back to Louisiana and checked into a motel. I started selling drugs and sex to pay for my room. It felt good to actually make my own decisions. One day, a friend from the motel asked me to go to New Orleans. There, I met my first pimp. He took pictures of me and posted them on a trafficking website. So, I would have sex and he got paid. One night, after he and I fought, the police came and took me to a psych ward in Baton Rouge, where I got away from him.



Through one bad situation after another, I returned to the only life I ever knew. I got on a dating website, where I met Cedric and fell in love. Cedric got on drugs with me and became abusive. In 2017, I was arrested in a prostitution sting. Trafficking Hope came in and told me about The WellHouse, but I chose jail instead. Cedric bonded me out the next day. We stayed together another two years, drugging, escorting, and him abusing me. We went back to Alabama and he met someone else. He left me tied up in a hotel. Somehow, I got loose. There was a trucker parked across from the hotel going to Florida, so I went too.

In Florida, I remembered hearing about The WellHouse and found the courage to call. I was desperate. I arrived at the WellHouse in 2019. After a few ups and downs, I graduated in 2020. When I arrived, I felt dead inside. Now, I've become closer to Jesus and have been restored to my family. I never saw past the life I was living. With the help of The WellHouse and the people who have poured into me, I now love myself. I wanted to help other women who had been trafficked, so I applied and was hired as The WellHouse Trauma Center Home Coordinator. I love what I do here. I am not the bitter, broken, and damaged woman that I was. I am loved and have love to give.

WHAT WE DO



A CRY FOR HELP

It begins with a call to the crisis line, where the cry for help and, ultimately, hope meets opportunity at The WellHouse.

FROM VICTIM TO SURVIVOR



Within a short time, the victim becomes a survivor as she leaves behind the horrific victimization she has endured. She travels - sometimes with help - by bus, train, plane, or car to The WellHouse campus in Alabama.

WELLHOUSE TRAUMA CENTER



For the first time, she is safe. She arrives with a few belongings. The pain on her face begins to subside as she slowly exhales a lifetime of trauma. A clean room and bed, a nice shower, and a home-cooked meal all spell safety and hope. Having a Home Coordinator who cares for her as she settles in, and a Trauma Therapist who shows empathy and compassion, is just the beginning of what she is to experience on her healing journey.

THE IMMEDIATE SHELTER



After transitioning to The Immediate Shelter, while still battling fears and uncertainty, she begins to understand her victimization. As she fights fear in the hard work of recovery, along the way she comes to know that she can change her life. Through compassionate therapy, she has the possibility of reconciliation with her children. Hope has exploded in her heart, and it shows in her whole countenance. She decides she wants to keep moving toward the life she was created to have.

NEXT STEPS TO FREEDOM

She develops a recovery plan just for her with the help of her Case Manager. It may include custody of a child, GED and college, a career path, or her newfound faith! A glance back at her first arrival reveals noticeable change. She completes her goals with some occasional steps backward, when those surrounding her catch and bring her back. Many, including a dedicated mentor, pray for her, love her well, and extend grace, all of which help her stay on the path of healing.



GRADUATION

Finally, the day of completion arrives, and she graduates! The ceremony is priceless, as many who have come alongside her in her restoration journey come to celebrate her accomplishment! Countless goals have been reached and she is ready to move to transitional living in the apartments, which she had her sights set on since she arrived.




NEXT STEPS TO INDEPENDENCE

Transformation has taken place in every area of her life: spiritually, emotionally, physically, and mentally. Pathways in the brain have begun healing as she is no longer abused or forced to abuse substances, and the trauma has subsided. She is hardly recognizable from the moment she entered The WellHouse, except for those dreams that she dared to believe could be hers. And she has succeeded!



2021 SURVIVOR DATA




Researchers at the Polaris
Project studied data from
the U.S. National Human
Trafficking Hotline in 2020
and found that human
trafficking appears to be
"pandemic-proof."

They identified 16,658 victims of human trafficking and saw a 22% increase for online recruitment.*

Additionally, they found 42% of victims were brought into human trafficking by a member of their own family, and 39% were recruited by an intimate partner or a marriage proposition.







WELLHOUSE CHILD

A 10 Year Vision Realized

Since our founding, our leadership has had a vision to establish a program within The WellHouse to serve minors who have experienced the atrocities of human trafficking. Further, we were determined that this program would operate according to the high standards applied to the adult program.

WellHouse Child is a residential therapy program for female youth. It gives underage victims a safe place to heal from their trauma. Each girl participates in daily therapy and the various other programs in place for their restoration.

In the Fall of 2021, our vision became a reality. WellHouse Child became licensed, opened its doors, and began receiving trafficked girls. We have dedicated and trained staff in place, and we strive to go above and beyond the minimum standards required by the State.

We remain grateful for this opportunity as we seek to serve this population of highly traumatized youth with the best staff using the best means available. We do so with much gratitude to those who have walked alongside us in this endeavor and the many who have supported this effort.
